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President's Message from Jane Gultinan, N.D.

It's Spring, yeah! I hope the sun is bringing you light, warmth, and lots of beautiful blooms.

The AANP is ever busy, with committees working hard on their work plans for the year, website revisions being planned, active organizing for the upcoming DC FLI in May, and planning well under way for the annual convention in Portland in August. In addition, we continue to actively support state licensing efforts, work hard to continue building relationships on the federal level, and continue our implementation of our public awareness and branding campaign.

In April, the AANP will convene a meeting of the

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Naturopathic Coordinating Council (NCC). The NCC is a group of organizations related to the naturopathic profession, and includes the AANP, AANMC (Association of Accredited Naturopathic Medical colleges), CNME (Council on Naturopathic Medical Education), NPLEX (Naturopathic Physicians Licensing Examination), NABNE (North American Board of Naturopathic Examiners), INM (Institute of Natural Medicine), NDI (Natural Doctors International), NMSA (Naturopathic Medical Student Association), and others. The purpose for the twice yearly meetings of the NCC is to identify, prioritize, and assign lead responsibility for key professional priorities. Examples of recent successfully completed priorities include the re-recognition of the CNME by the Department of Education, the increase in Stafford Loan limits for naturopathic medical students, and a recommendation to reclassify naturopathic medical education from a Graduate Program category to a First Professional Degree category by the Carnegie Commission on Higher Education, placing ND's on the same level as MD's, DDS's, DVM's, and other physicians in this classification system. Upon final approval, this should assist us in state licensing efforts, with student financial assistance programs and with other professional issues.

You all may be aware from my previous communication that a group called the National Naturopathic Council has filed an application to Trademark the term Doctor of Naturopathic Medicine, ND, and all derivatives of the title. I am pleased to report that the U.S. Patent and Trademark Office (PTO) has denied the group's application based on the fact that a professional degree is not eligible for a certification trademark and the fact that ND is too generic for trademark. Attached to the government's ruling were 25 pages of information on the use of Doctor of Naturopathy by our accredited schools. Once again the government has affirmed the legitimate credentials of our profession. The NNC does have one year to appeal this decision, but we are advised it is highly unlikely the PTO would reverse itself. We have

issued a press release so that all state officials, NDs and their patients, and policy makers across the country can be aware that the assertion PTO awarded exclusive use of our titles is false. This stands as a clear example of our need to stand unified as we move our agenda forward.

The 3rd annual Naturopathic Gathering occurred at NNCM on February 10, 11, and 12. This was a wonderful event, dedicated to teaching and preserving the principles and philosophies of naturopathic medicine. Many of our esteemed leaders and elders participated as faculty, and I was especially moved to see that three of these faculty members were past presidents of the AANP. Doctors Jim Sensinig, Cathy Rogers, and Tom Kruzel were there, and continue to demonstrate their ongoing commitment to this profession in so many ways. Thank you to Jim, Cathy, and Tom, and all the many others in our profession who go above and beyond the call of duty to not only teach, provide health care, or conduct research, but also to serve and advance our profession on so many other levels.

It is through all of our collective contributions, big and small, clinical and political, nature cure and high tech naturopathic medicine, that our small tribe of healers and teachers are, drop by drop, wearing away the rock and creating ripples that are impacting faraway shores. Let's keep going, shall we?

From the Office, Karen E. Howard - Trademark Application Denied

Trademark Application for ND DENIED

On February 10, a Beverly Betancur issued a press release claiming states have been "fraudulently issuing licenses designating "N.D." (Doctor of Naturopathy)." She then asserted that "The Naturopathic National Council, Inc. (NNC) owns the title Doctor of Naturopathy, N.D.(TM) and the derivative title Doctor of Naturopathic

Medicine because it is the first organization to file an application with the United States Patent and Trademark Office."

Impossible? We think so, and now the U.S. Patent and Trade Office (PTO) has ruled against the Naturopathic National Council . [Click here](#) to read the AANP Press Release in our News Room.

According to the U.S. PTO's office ruling, a title or degree is not a "certification mark," which was what NNC was filing for. Title and degrees indicate qualification or attainments of the person, they do not certify services performed by this person. In addition, the mark is generic. The PTO, upon further review stated, "applicant's amendment to seek registration on the Supplemental Register has raised the following new issue. Registration is refused because the proposed mark is generic for the services the applicant certifies." The attorney in charge went on to state the "The internet Google search evidence attached to the Office Action demonstrates that many colleges and universities offer a "Doctor of Naturopathy, ND" degree Program." The attorney attached 25 additional pages showing the term "Doctor of Naturopathy, ND" is a degree given out by our colleges in Canada and the U.S.

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The NNC claim to "solely hold the right" to ND is false, and the Federal Government has once again affirmed the legitimacy of our credentials. This fruitless attack stands as an illustration of how our successes make us a target. We as a profession, and as individuals must be proactive in our efforts to build relationship outside our community. Not only to increase our chances for success, but also to fully establish our credentials to the broadest possible audience so that future attacks - in whatever form they appear - will be equally unsuccessful.

AANP has no need to take any action at this time. However, NNC has a year to protest the PTO action. While

it seems unlikely the PTO can be convinced the mark is not generic and should be registered, we must remain aware that NNC has also called upon all 50 states to cease and desist issuing licensing for NDs, an example of the ill-considered actions that anyone or any organization can assert. Therefore, we remain vigilant in our efforts to ensure the public is fully informed, and we welcome collaboration in this regard.

You no longer have access to the members' site to register for events, find your fellow students on the new Student Directory, or access other member benefits including the new Health Savings Account option. You have also been delisted from Find ND - but don't worry! A simple click to renew can restore your account right away. AANP Alliance Update

Legislative sessions across the nation are now in full swing. Naturopathic licensing bills have been introduced or re-introduced in 7 states (FL, IL, MA, MN, MO, NY, VA). While most of these bills are unlikely to result in licensure this session, the continued legislative activity brings each of these states closer to ultimate licensure. An introduced bill creates the opportunity for the conversation, education and alliance building that are so critical in licensure. Having a bill prioritizes the issue to legislators such that they will make time for the conversations, presentations, and other communications regarding naturopathic licensure. An introduced bill requires continued vigilance and lots of work on the part of the state naturopathic association in order to capitalize on this opportunity and educate as many legislators and members of the public as possible. New York is a good

case in point.

The naturopathic licensing bill was in the Higher Education committee at the beginning of February. In mid-February, the NYANP sponsored a lobby day which had participation of about 100 people. These supporters (mostly NY NDs and their patients and some students) met with legislators, had an exhibit and a catered lunch. The day was very successful - the licensure effort gained great visibility and the bill doubled the number of Assembly sponsors! The bill passed out of committee during the Lobby Day- with the understanding that the NYANP and Medical Society meet. These conversations began during the month of February. Meanwhile, the NYANP continues to develop their grassroots support network, engage in fundraising activities and develop PR opportunities.

Each state has their own list of activities that supports their legislation and the effort towards licensure. It is the combined effect of each of these state efforts that augments the strength and sophistication of the Alliance. While a laborious and slow process, licensure will happen in all states; it is simply a matter of time.

Call for Nominations for AANP President-elect, and the Board of Directors

This call for nominations marks our fourth year of a new governance process for the AANP. Your participation and attention to this process is the only thing that will insure the continuity and growth of our association. This year we will formally have a new President-elect who will automatically become AANP President at the end of Dr. Gultinan's two-year term, which expires December 31, 2007. We will also elect four Board Members of the American Association of Naturopathic Physicians.

To be nominated for President-Elect, a nominee must have been a board member for at least a single two year

term. To be nominated for a position as a Director on the Board one must have been a member of the association for at least two years immediately prior to his/her nomination and can be a regular, student, associate or supporting member as defined by our by-laws.

Only one Student at a time can serve as a representative to the Board, and the student must be a dues paying member of the Association for at least one year prior to serving on the Board and must be in the third or fourth year of school at one of the accredited colleges. Please note, there is no reserved director slot for a student. The student candidates run against all other nominees in the election process.

The President-Elect may be delegated by the President to perform her/his duties, in the event of any temporary disability or absence of the President from meetings, and shall have such other duties as the President or the Board may assign. The President-Elect shall, prior to becoming president, propose to the Board of Directors all committee and other appointments appropriate for her/his administration. The President-Elect shall become President without election following the end of the term of the outgoing President.

The formal petition for nomination must be submitted by April 20, 2006 and will include a nominating petition signed by the candidate and five regular AANP members

A signed agreement by the candidate to serve in the office for the stated term, including from the candidate affirming familiarity with all governing documents and with policy regarding the elections process

A copy of his/her current professional license to practice for any profession requiring one and a copy of educational degrees and diplomas

A statement of up to 500 words, from the candidate for

publication to the voting members.
A resume or curriculum vitae is optional.

May 14-15 Help us Educate the U.S. Congress on the Power of Naturopathic Medicine!

What is the DC FLI?

Our Annual Federal Legislative Initiative is traditionally held in May in Washington DC and is open to all AANP members. This call to Washington is our national lobby day where we take our interests on key federal policy initiatives to our own individual members. First and foremost is our desire to educate Congress on what naturopathic medicine is - second to promote inclusion of naturopathic medicine in federal programs - and always, to advocate for sound policy relating to natural medicine.

What are we asking Congress to do?

1. Include naturopathic physicians in the Indian Loan Repayment Program by changing the definition of provider in the Indian Health Care Improvement Act. This effort is in its third year and all signs point to passage in this legislative session. We are NOT included in the Senate Bill, and continue to await introduction of the House bill.

2. Fully implement the Dietary Supplemental Health and Education Act, better known as DSHEA. Efforts are ongoing at the FDA to write new standards that would ensure the highest quality for many of the products naturopathic doctors use. It is essential that NDs, as the only doctoral-level providers trained to use herbs and botanicals, step up to the plate now and assert a position that fully protects the public without unfairly restricting access.

Why should I travel to DC to participate?

We are all aware that our health care system as we know it is collapsing. If naturopathic medicine is to be a part of the solution - we must make every effort to speak with a unified voice and teach the people who will decide the future why we must be at the discussion table! You may know that naturopathic medicine is central to fixing our current health care crises, but does your Senator or Congressman know that????

What can I expect to happen in these two days?

Day One is training. Come and participate in our second Mock Congress where you have the ability to pass or defeat the very legislation we've been working on for the past two years - the Indian Health Care Improvement Act. Who knows, you could play the role of Mr. Abramoff himself.

In addition, we will be educating you on the election process and the ways you can make a difference. After that, we'll spend some time walking you through our talking points and the actual meetings you will have on Day Two.

Day Two is spent on the Hill where you will attend meetings that we arrange for you with your Members of Congress and Staff. We will have a place for you to debrief us and we will conclude the day with a Health Fair and Reception in the Rayburn House Office Building.

This wonderful event is done in conjunction with the House Bi-partisan Caucus on Disabilities. Our event includes several tables staffed with NDs who serve foods associated with prevention and treatment for a number of chronic and disabling diseases and conditions. It is extremely well attended and we have generated somewhat of a reputation for putting on a great event. By moving it to the evening hours we anticipate substantially more people than our usual 200 or so, and perhaps some Members of Congress as well.

In-Office Research Awards for 2006, Dr. Judy Fulop, N.D.

In-office Research Award 2006 to be presented at AANP Convention

Each year for several years the AANP has offered an In-office Research Award with cash prizes of up to \$4000 for the best clinical research study completed by practicing association members. The Award will again be made at the convention in August with the winner(s) selected by the AANP Scientific Affairs Committee. This year, the Committee encourages data from prospective case series of naturopathic therapies, either single or multi modality, in any health condition. However, in-office clinical observational or intervention studies yielding original data illuminating any area of naturopathic practice or theory will be considered. The main criteria for selection will be the significance of the issues addressed in the study and the soundness of the research methods used. Submissions must include the rationale for the study and treatment, the specific aim of the project, the methods and measures used, and the results. Committee members are available to discuss your research prior to your research submission. Agaricus blazei Murrill - The medicinal mushroom from Brazil, Karen Sigurdson, N.D.

For thousands of years, mushrooms have been used as food and medicine. The Greek physician Hippocrates (460 BC - 377 BC) considered to be the "Father of Medicine", mentions in his writings the use of fungi to treat chronic illness of the kidney. Although the ancient Greeks used

only a few mushrooms their influence was felt in Europe throughout the ages. For the past century, many scientists from Eastern European countries studied medicinal mushrooms and their effects on health. The existing data proves the Chinese have been using mushrooms for over 3000 years, but there is some evidence that their use may go as far back as 7000 years! Chinese Pharmacopeias document the use of over 100 different types of medicinal mushrooms by practitioners of Traditional Chinese Medicine (TCM) for a wide range of ailments. The use of mushrooms date back hundreds of years in Japan. The most known and widely used medicinal mushrooms are Reishi, Maitake, Shitake, Cordyceps, Agaricus blazei Murrill among others. In Western Medicine, many clinically important drugs have been derived directly or indirectly from mushrooms, such as, anti-biotics, penicillin, hormones (Progesterone), pain medication (Morphine, Cortisone), anti-fungal and anti-cancer drugs. The first chemotherapy drug approved by the FDA in the 1980's was derived from a mushroom.

The Agaricus blazei Murrill (AbM) mushroom, a Basidiomycete fungus, is native to the Atlantic Rainforest region in southeastern Brazil, where it has been part of the regular diet of the residents of the area for many generations. Researchers in the late sixties discovered a very low incidence of chronic illness, among the local people, such as cancer, diabetes, cardiovascular and heart disease. This discovery led them to believe the AbM mushroom was a contributing factor. AbM mushroom samples were sent to the Pharmacological Department at Tokyo University and the National Cancer Center in Japan, for further evaluation and to establish its effect on cancer. The research primarily focused on the anti-tumor properties of the beta-glucans found in the AbM mushroom and its pharmacological effects. The positive results of the research were presented at the Japan Pharmacological Association and the Japan Cancer Association in 1970. 1

It is believed cancer develops as a result of a weak immune system due to aging or other factors. Researchers quest to discover factors, which enhance the immune system, have focused attention more and more on the AbM mushroom. Compared to other commonly used Oriental mushrooms - including Maitake, Reishi, and Shiitake, the AbM mushroom contains larger quantities of polysaccharides, mainly Beta-D-Glucan, and other components unique to AbM which have been attributed immune enhancing and modulating effects, reducing hyper-reaction of the immune system and thus contributing to an enhanced equilibrium or homeostasis. Generally studies have revealed AbM's immune-stimulating properties. AbM is a great preventative aid in its ability to maintain health and promote healing by enhancing the immune system. The polysaccharides, and their derivatives increase phagocytes, natural killer cell and T-cell activity; stimulate production of Interferon, Interleukin-1 and cytokine production, which mobilize the immune cells resulting from bone marrow production. 2

Most AbM research studies focused on cancer research have shown Beta-D-Glucan (Beta 1,3 and Beta 1,6 Glucan) to possess anti-mutagenic, anti-metastatic and anti-tumor effects due to immunological host mediated mechanisms. The studies also demonstrate cytotoxic effects against various types of cancer such as, human ovarian and breast cancers. The WHO estimates about 1.2 million women develop breast cancer every year. It is the most common form of invasive female cancer. The most common form of treatment is radiotherapy, surgery and/or chemotherapy, but they frequently result in serious side effects that cause damage and discomfort to patients undergoing treatment. These side effects are greatly reduced, as well as, cancer growth itself through immunotherapy, even in last stage cancers, by boosting the body's own immune system to fight off cancer cells. The proteins, glycoprotein's, polysaccharides and lipopolysaccharides found in mushrooms have these immune enhancing properties. Because of these

promising results, Immunotherapy is gaining worldwide attention of the scientific community. Research demonstrates that advanced breast cancers do not respond very well to chemotherapy treatments as the tumor cells circumvent the chemo preventative drugs. Hormonal therapy for ER-positive breast cancers have had a good response, however, ER-negative cancers are more challenging due to their drug resistance. Studies show an abnormal expression of the enzyme aromatase can be considered a risk factor for breast cancer. The enzyme aromatase converts androgen to estrogen. Research shows that AbM suppresses aromatase activity. In a 2002 study by Dr. T. Mizuno, a prominent scientist in biochemistry of medicinal mushrooms in Japan described a case of a breast cancer patient, which had surgery and after 7 years developed lung metastasis. This patient was given an AbM extract and after 3 months results showed complete recovery from cancer. 3

A recent study published in the International Journal of Gynecological Cancers showed the use of AbM in conjunction with chemotherapy treatments, as Carboplatin and Taxol, showed improved peripheral blood results, increases in IgM and IgE values and reduced nausea, fatigue and anorexia. 3 Other studies suggest AbM reduces the side effects of cancer patients undergoing radiation treatments. A 2005 Japanese study, on the antitumor effects of intratumoral injection of Basidiomycetes preparations, in an experimental mouse model, using the "double grafted tumor system" shows the AbM mushroom extracted from fruit bodies preparation, cured primary tumor and inhibited the growth of metastatic tumor.4

Another important component in AbM is Ergosterol, a natural anti-angiogenesis substance shown to inhibit the production of substances that originate in the tumor. These properties stimulate neogenesis of the capillaries. By inhibiting the growth of the tumor through the circulatory system, it becomes smaller in size and consequently more responsive to chemotherapy and surgery. Ergosterol combined with Beta-D-Glucan account

for innumerable successful therapies, such as, immunotherapy. AbM also has the highest levels of Ergosterol compared to other mushrooms. 5 Other tumor fighting components found in the AbM mushroom are: xyloglucan, acid heteroglucan, ribonucleic acid protein compounds and lectin, which augment macrophage activity. The natural steroids found in AbM have an anti-cancer effect in contrast to chemically produced steroids, which may cause cancer. These natural steroids have been shown to be particularly effective in the prevention of uterine cancer. AbM is rich in Linoleic Acid, which has Antimutagenic activity. AbM mushroom food supplements are a nutritionally well balanced valuable health food. The mushroom contains valuable ingredients, such as essential amino acids, vitamins, minerals, vegetable proteins, anti-oxidants, enzymes, dietary crude fibers, natural sterols, Triterpenes, Saponins and polysaccharides which stimulate the immune system. The AbM mushroom consists of a total of 192 nutrients. AbM mushroom have no known side effects and toxicity studies have confirmed its safety. 6 Hence, for many years, AbM is used in hospitals as adjunct nutritional therapy for cancer patients in Brazil, Europe, Japan and other Asian countries.
